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### Pupil Premium Report for 2016-2017 and Predicted Spending for 2017-2018.

### Hevingham & Marham Primary Schools.

Pupil Premium is additional to main school funding and it is allocated to children from low-income families that are currently known to be eligible for free school meals in both mainstream and non-mainstream settings and children who have been looked after children for more than six months.

- At Hevingham and Marham Primary School Partnership we strive for better outcomes for every child, ensuring that all of our children have ambition to succeed no matter what their background is.
- We have dedicated senior leader that monitors pupil premium funding and the progress of pupil premium children.
- The schools have a clear policy that is updated in line with any regional and national changes, but reflects our views and aims as practitioners.
- Parents are engaged in their children's learning as we have regular contact via learning conversations, reports and informal meetings.
- Teachers clearly identify PP children in their plans, ensuring that they are specifically catered for in class.
- During our half termly Pupil Progress Meetings, pupil premium children are identified, monitored, tracked and appropriate support allocated if needed to ensure that those children are enabled to close any gaps.
- Children are taught about teaching and learning styles. They are aware of the mind set and how it supports their learning. Classes are taught about self and peer assessment and regularly carry this out in their lessons and extra-curricular activities.
- Research has shown that the most effective way to support children's learning is effective feedback and marking. All staff have had extensive training in this area.



## Pupil Premium allocation

### Pupil Premium at Hevingham Primary School:

In the financial Year 2016-2017, the pupil premium received at Hevingham Primary school was £19,800 and there were 15 children entitled to pupil premium.

This year, 2017-2018 there are 15 pupils entitled to pupil premium, with an allowance of £1,320 giving the school a total of £19,800.

### Pupil Premium at Marsham Primary School:

In the financial Year 2016-2017, the pupil premium received at Marsham Primary school was £23,440 and there were 18 children entitled to pupil premium.

This year, 2017-2018 there are 18 pupils entitled to pupil premium, with an allowance of £1,320 (£1000 for LAC pupils) giving the school a total of £23,400.



## How money was spent in 2016-2017 -

- To subsidise or pay for residential trips.
- Uniforms
- Visitors into school to supplement learning
- Entire wage towards a dedicated nurture teacher to work with the children in groups or individually, providing support in the form of circle time, buddies, self-esteem and social skills.
- Specialist training and advice for teachers
- Early years support
- Entire teacher wages to support small groups in class
- Training for TA's
- Parent support group run by a dedicated nurture teacher
- School milk
- Clubs including athletics and multi-skills

## How the money is planning to be spent in 2017-2018

The money will be used for many of the above reasons. We will be hiring new Teaching Assistants at both schools to provide high quality small group focussed on overcoming gaps in learning. The money is also being spent on hiring a qualified and experienced teacher to deliver small group work therefore improving opportunities for effective teaching and accelerating pupil progress. Having a qualified teacher with small group of children has been proven to be one of the most effective forms of intervention that children can receive. We will also be continuing to hire our nurture teacher, an invaluable resource in both schools.
